

### WHEN TO VISIT

All seasons offer unique and magical experiences. Vintage runs between January and April (see region), and is a bustling time to visit as people from near and far arrive to help pick grapes and make wine. The vine leaves turn orange and the land, a vibrant green in May with the first rainfall. It is truly stunning. Winter (June -August) is perfect for relaxed, cosy days enjoying local cuisine. The forests around the vineyards glow with wildflowers in September and then Summer returns by late November for enjoying Western Australia's pristine beaches.



# PRE-BOOK EXPERIENCES

Many cellar doors are open daily and will be pleased to welcome you for a wine tasting without a booking. For something extra special, there are a variety of bespoke tours and unique winery experiences that allow you to fully immerse yourself in the local wine culture. Bookings are essential.

Go off the beaten track with smaller owners or winemakers who are happy meet you at their property for a tasting with advanced notice. Many renowned food and wine festivals also take place during the year.



# TRAVELLING AROUND

A comfortable, reliable vehicle is essential for travelling around the wine regions. This can be your own car, a hire car, or leave the driving to someone else by joining a wine tour. As for tours, there are a range of options for your wine journey - everything from luxury chauffeurs to Kombi vans. bush tucker wine tours and more. These can span one day or a few. Taxis in regional towns can be scarce, and ride share services like Uber aren't yet available, so plan transport in advance or select your accommodation with this in mind.

# TASTE WINE LIKE A PRO

Wine is made to be shared and Western Australia's wineries have many characterful people waiting to introduce you to their creations. Tasting is an adventure of the senses, so savour the wines you love most, but don't be afraid to use your spittoon. Cleanse your palate and hydrate with water whenever you can. Even if you are tasting with the winemaker, it is always ok to ask for a spittoon, especially if you are the driver. You can always buy a bottle for later!



# VISIT A FEW REGIONS

The joy of travelling around WA is the space to get out into nature and discover the Earth's diverse and magnificent beauty which varies dramatically through the wine regions. Perth Hills and the Swan Valley are within 30 minutes drive of capital city, Perth, for a day trip, while three to five days will allow you to explore the iconic Margaret River or Great Southern and neighbouring regions. Allow up to ten days to travel through all wine regions in a single trail.



# TAKE CARE OF THE VINES

Western Australia has some of the only remaining vineyards in the world that can grow vines on their own rootstock because all of its wine regions are free of a vine pest called Phylloxera.

To help preserve these rare and treasured vines, avoid walking through vine rows unless you are invited to in your tour. Don't worry, there are plenty of photos you can take around the vines to share your experience with friends and family.



# THE SWAN VALLEY History in the Making

Established in 1829, the Swan Valley is one of Australia's oldest wine growing regions, second in age only to the Hunter Valley, which was established a few years prior.

The region is flourishing with magnificent wineries, breweries, distilleries, gourmet artisan producers, handcrafted wares, markets, art studios and a myriad of eateries, just 25 minutes from Perth.

The earth is rich and fruit and vegetables ripen to perfection under a warm sun. Grape varietals flourish in this region that takes its fresh produce seriously. Strong family lineage still remains within some of the oldest wineries, and a new generation is bringing renewed energy to the wine scene

### THE ORIGINALS

### **Explore Heritage Wineries**

The Swan Valley is a special place where wineries have heritage that transcends many generations. Olive Farm Wines is a four generation winery whose story dates back to 1829. Its cellar door is architecturally designed and their vine to bottle tour is a great window into the region's past and present. Sandalford's history dates back to 1840. Its restaurant is a drawcard, along with a popular Perth to Swan Valley cruise tour. The historic Houghton cellar door and wine memorabilia museum has been preserved at Nikola Wines, while family-run John Kosovich Wines, Talijancich Wines, Windy Creek Estates and Edgecombe Brothers have been making impressive table and fortified wines since the 1920s and 1930s. A tasting (often with the family) is a precious opportunity in the context of Australian wine history.

### THE MID-CENTURY VINEYARDS

### **Unassuming Wineries with Truly Beautiful Stories**

From the 1950s, another wave of wineries emerged in the Swan Valley, many established by migrants from Europe who worked labour-intensive jobs to save for land, upon which vines were planted. Vino Italia and Valley Wines are two examples making wine in their 'Nonno's' style that is available by the flagon to take away. Ambrook Wines focus on Italian wines from similarly aged vines and serve delicious antipasto

platters, while a tasting with the family winemakers of <u>Garbin Estate</u> is an experience to treasure. <u>Jane Brook Estate's</u> deli is offers delicious tapanades and cheeses to enjoy with wine on their lovely grounds, while <u>Lamonts</u> is a Western Australian institution for a Sunday long lunch. A 30 minute drive west lands you at <u>Paul Conti Wines</u> of the same era, where the original homestead is now a fine dining restaurant.













# UNIQUE EXPERIENCES FOR ALL TASTES

### Wineries to Linger a Little Longer

Mandoon Estate is a favourite for all tastes with a winery, a brewery and an art gallery. Their Bush Tucker tour is an awesome way to learn about Wadjuk culture. Weekends at Ugly Duckling Wines are buzzing with live, local music, occasional artisan market days and gourmet pies. The housemade pies at Heafod Glen Winery's old hayshed cellar are delicious too. Sittella's imaginative restaurant architecture and earth-rendered winery is a jewel of the region for a superb lunch, as is the local-produce driven menu at **Black Swan Winery**. For tasty Italian cuisine with a side of award-winning wine, visit Pinelli Estate or Riverbank Estate. Travel behind the scenes at the lauded **Faber Vineyard** or **Upper Reach,** home of WA's only breakfast and winery tour. Their wine appreciation class is incredibly fun too. The paddle boats at Oakover Estate or The Laughin' Barrel's playground are great for kids.

### Pop By these Fascinating, Niche Wineries

Creative winemaking runs throughout the Swan Valley's lengthy history and there are many small cellar doors to drop into and discover specialist winemakers that are bringing new energy to the Valley. Swan Valley Wines have a love for nature and a minimal intervention approach to their one-of-akind wines. At Harris Organic Wine learn how organic wine is made with a guided walking tour through their vineyard, underground cellar and winery. If it's August, don't miss Mann Estate's unassuming cellar door; home of epic sparkling wine and their proprietary grape, Cygne Blanc, which sells out quickly upon release. Pandemonium Estate, Little

Black Dog Wines, Corymbia and Vino Volta represent a new generation's perspective on winemaking in the region and a tasting appointment with these artisan producers will reveal why trendy Perth sommeliers are obsessed with these producers. Similarly, the 100 year old vines at Henley Park and Tylers Wines may be in new hands, but make some very special wines that are great to share with friends at a dinner party. Break up the tastings with a glass of wine and relaxed cheese platter at Lancaster Estate's rustic tasting shed, or if quaint is more your style, the French inspired Little River Winery is a treasure with delicious French food in its cafe next door.



# PERTH HILLS

An easy 30 minute drive from Perth city, the Perth Hills is the perfect escape to absorb the abundant flora and fauna of the Darling Scarp. The boutique winemaking scene comprises of mostly owner-operator artisan producers, making award-winning, progressive wines. Taste with the owners or enjoy casual to deluxe vineyard dining that is guaranteed to be relaxing. Weekends are the best time for a day trip or an overnight recharge in nature.





A tasting of the estategrown, handpicked wines of Lion Mill Vineyard with their friendly winemakers will reward enthusiasts, plus the kids will love their alpacas.





# **PEEL**


An emerging wine region with around 200 hectares of wine grapes, Peel is located south and south-east of Perth, beside the regional centre of Mandurah. Peel stretches from the Indian Ocean, then east to the Perth Hills and Wandering, offering diverse climatic conditions for viticulture, plus unique nature-based experiences. Most wineries are located within an hour's drive from Perth CBD, making Peel a popular day-trip destination.



## **MANDURAH**

### The Original Base

The major regional centre of Peel, Mandurah is a buzzing place with stunning canals and waterways. It is a great base if staying in the region. Foodies will love the restaurants of Dolphin Quay and Ocean Marina which feature local wine and seafood. A quick 20 minute drive north gets you to **Peel Estate Wines**, the first winery in the region. After your wine tasting in the colonial-style cellar door, stroll the gardens, stay for a picnic or perhaps enjoy live music on selected Sundays in summer. Around the corner, book a tasting with WA's chilli winemaking experts, **Stakehill Estate Winery**.

## LAKE CLIFTON

### Family Friendly & The Thrombolites

Visit the largest Thrombolite reef in the southern hemisphere. Thrombolites are the oldest living rocks on earth and best seen in March and April. What's better, they are located just a 60 metre walk from Cape Bouvard Winery, a family-friendly place for lunch. It's hard to leave nearby **Lake** Clifton Winery without a bottle of their tasty mango wine or plum port. Lake Clifton is a perfect day trip from Perth or Mandurah and several tours make this journey incredibly easy. 20 minutes inland from Lake Clifton (or 30 minutes from Mandurah), will land you in Waroona to visit **Drakesbrook** Wines at the top of the Darling

Scarp. Owner Bernard grows an interesting mix of 17 traditional and alternative grape varieties for his small batch wines and often sells free range eggs and citrus fruits from the cellar door / cafe too. Drakesbrook Weir or Lake Navarino are nice spots to swim, fish, canoe, picnic, bushwalk and birdwatch. Another 40 minutes east gets you to Dwellingup, a town with quaint cafes, a traditional pub, and **Redgum** Wine Estate which is undergoing major refurbishment and due to reopen mid-2021. Another hour east at Wandering is **Tanglefoot** Wines with a lovely cellar door and café.





A perfect stop before Margaret River or Southern Forests, Busselton is famous for its 1.8km jetty, the longest of its kind in the southern hemisphere. Visit the acclaimed Capel Vale winery for a late lunch or high tea, then discover Australia's first wine sensory garden at Whicher Ridge, planted with fruit trees, herbs, flowers and vegetables to reflect the flavours of their wines. The calm white sandy beaches are great for swimming, fishing and canoeing. Busselton also hosts regional WA's largest annual events program.

Mount Lennard's bike trails attract riders from near and far, and no trip is complete without seeing the 5,000 gnomes of Gnomesville.

# **DONNYBROOK**

A Produce Mecca with the Best Playground Ever

Home of a small Australian gold rush in the late 1800s, today the valleys glisten with wine grapes, olives, nuts and apples. In Donnybrook you'll find some of Geographe's best emerging wineries. Try **Barrecas'** reds; their Barbera often sells out. Dogfriendly Barton Jones has a cool, solar-powered, straw cellar door with great views and platters. Taste local delicacy, Marron at Smallwater Estate or seek out Oakway Estate's epic long table lunch. Nearby, Australia's biggest free playground is perfect for kids.







### A Breathtaking Wine Destination

The lure of this pristine, coastal region spreads far and wide. In less than fifty years, Margaret River has achieved a reputation as a world-leading fine wine region, particularly for its Cabernet Sauvignon and Chardonnay. One of Australia's most desirable culinary travel destinations, the region's worldly winemakers, chefs and creatives bring a vast background of expertise to deliver truly memorable experiences. The geographically-isolated environment features the most ancient soils on Earth. The ecosystem is globally important as one of 32 biodiversity hotspots, home to abundant populations of endemic flora and flora. Wines tend toward the elegant and refined, and winemakers have a strong persuasion towards expressing Margaret River's distinct terroir. In this pursuit, organic viticulture is on the rise with wineries of small to significant sizes.

### THE ORIGINALS

### Margaret River's Enduring Pioneers

The original wineries of Margaret River were established from the late 1960s and remain as significant today as they were back then. Vasse Felix and Leeuwin Estate offer some of Australia's leading winery destination experiences where you can easily spend a day. Book into an immersive behind-thescenes wine tour, lunch in their highly-acclaimed restaurants or stroll around their art galleries. The winery tour at **Cape Mentelle** is another opportunity to discover the winemaking approach of a regional hero, while the esteemed **Cullen Wines** embraces its biodynamic wine philosophy in many ways, including a focus on estate-grown produce on its restaurant menu. This provenance-rich pairing makes their wines shine extra bright. Fine wine collectors will also love a private appointment at Moss Wood, or a visit to the Woodlands Wines and Juniper Estate cellar doors.


### Magical Destinations for a Quintessential Margaret River Wine Experience

Many Margaret River cellar doors are spectacular monuments in their own right, with their thoughtful architecture and manicured grounds taken as seriously as the winemaking process itself. Visitors really are spoilt for choice in this region. The quality of wine, dining and experiences is consistently high, especially at these drawcard estates.

<u>Voyager Estate</u> and <u>Xanadu</u> are two celebrated wineries just south of Margaret River town, both with perfect grounds, friendly cellar doors and celebrated restaurants. Recently organic-certified, Voyager also offers several bookable wine masterclasses and dining experiences. Also in this pocket of Margaret River you will find <u>Stella Bella</u>, known especially for its vibrant Semillon Sauvignon Blancs. Visit their relaxed cellar door for a tasting, or continue driving to **Redgate Wines.** Amidst their regional wines is a tasty

Fortified Shiraz. Further south, stop at Hamelin Bay to see the stingrays or travel a little further to reach Cape Leeuwin, where the Indian and Southern Oceans meet. Stop at the contemporary <a href="Hamelin Bay Winery"><u>Hamelin Bay Winery</u></a> to re-energise with a Ploughman's Platter and a glass of crisp white wine from the cooler southern end of the Margaret River wine region.

North of Margaret River town there are significantly more cellar doors to visit. The architecturally-awarded Howard Park is an experience in itself. Many tasting options are available here, with the region's only sparkling wine flight as a highlight. Nearby, longstanding winery Lenton Brae's striking bell tower is equally special. Their weekday winery tour is often hosted by the owners, who have seen over 30 Margaret River vintages and have plenty of stories to tell. The fairytale-esque buildings of Fermoy Estate,







Knotting Hill, Amelia Park or Fraser Gallop Estate's manor are extremely photogenic, with each winery making well-collected regional styles. The sleek cellar doors of some very well-known Margaret River labels such as Evans & Tate, Robert Oatley and Brookland Valley are also in proximity, open daily and offering chic tastings. Dine at the latter's Flutes Restaurant for French-inspired cuisine, or try Rustico at Hay Shed Hill for Mediterranean tapas. For a relaxed vineyard lunch, visit Fishbone Wines, whose deluxe sushi is delicious, or graze on a platter at Larry Cherubino Wines, where the extensive wine range includes styles from Margaret River, the Great Southern and Southern Forests regions. Snake & Herring's portfolio reflects these diverse local wine regions as well.

Further north in Yallingup is one of Western Australia's most highly-awarded restaurants, **Wills Domain.** For

the ultimate indulgence, choose their three-course set menu. The ultimate chilled-out lunch stop is <a href="Swings & Roundabouts">Swings & Roundabouts</a>, known for their woodfired pizzas, live music and epic playground. You can easily spend all afternoon here with friends, family or a good book. If the kids are with you, stop by family-friendly <a href="Flametree Wines">Flametree Wines</a>, with its lovely Hamptons architecture and vast lawns or visit <a href="3 Oceans">3 Oceans</a> which has a kids zone with video games and toys. Bring your own picnic to <a href="Deep Woods Estate">Deep Woods Estate</a> to spend some serious time with their seriously-awarded wines and stunning views.

Up in Dunsborough, complete your time on Eagle Bay's calm beaches with a family-friendly winery lunch at <u>Wise Wine</u> or <u>Palmer Wines</u>. Alternatively, peruse the pottery gallery of <u>Happs Winery</u> before grabbing a basket to build your own picnic hamper of local cheeses and charcuterie to enjoy beside their vines.







## **DELIGHTFUL WINE FAMILIES**

### Authentic Experiences at Margaret River's Boutique Family Wineries

Small family wineries represent a significant portion of Margaret River's producers. Even the majority of the original pioneers and other major estates remain family-owned. The following boutique wineries are operations where there is a high chance you will meet the owner or winemaker during a visit. They are perfect for travellers who love to uncover quaint, artisan wines with wonderful family stories. Credaro Family Estate is a great place to start. The family of Italian heritage migrated to the Margaret River region in the 1920s. As is the Italian style, they made wines for their own private consumption over many decades. Take an afternoon picnic to their Tuscanstyle cellar door and enjoy classic Margaret River varieties alongside their family's favourite Italian styles. Gralyn Estate, Willespie, Ashbrook Estate and Woody Nook Wines each have vines dating

back to the late 1970s with nearly all remaining in the same family's hands since establishment. Many of these wines are only available directly from the winery, meaning you can find some wonderful treasures, such as stunning old-vine Cabernets and Margaret River heritage ports. Chardonnay lovers will enjoy Pierro, which has long been celebrated for its everlasting regional style. Thompson Estate, Victory Point Wines and Higher Plane are nearby wineries with an impressive awards cabinet for Cabernet and Chardonnay too. Domaine Naturaliste takes an agronomist's approach to wine, drawing upon extensive soil knowledge for their noteworthy wines. Their tasting room offers panoramic vineyard views. Alternatively, enjoy a relaxed vine-side afternoon of grazing on local treats such as Margaret River venison chorizo and house-made dips at the

charming <u>Brookwood Estate</u>, the optional wine tasting add on is ideal for people who like to try a little bit of everything. Chocolate addict? Enjoy the wine and artisan chocolate experiences hosted at 2020 Gourmet Traveller Wine Cellar Door Award winners <u>Arlewood Estate</u> and <u>Passel Estate</u>. Nature lovers will also appreciate exploring Passel Estate's conservation sanctuary, an initiative to help increase populations of threatened local fauna including the Western Ringtail Possum.

The best thing about a winery tour with a small operator is that the winemaker is often the host. For a seriously authentic experience, **Brown Hill Estate** 

gets into the finer details of their viticulture program for those interested in dirt, vines, pruning techniques and more. Winemaking 101 at <u>Cape Grace</u> is an interactive way to learn about the process from grape to bottle, while at <u>Evoi</u>, their winemaker-hosted experiences can include the rare museum wine tastings or even a vertical of historic vintages.

For a relaxed and authentic tasting experience, stop at the rustic and friendly cellar doors of FireTail / Roje Estates, Driftwood Estate and Peacetree Estate.

Mongrel Creek Wines, Beckett's Flat and Carpe Diem Wines are wonderful pint-sized operations with superb, lesser-known wines to be uncovered.



# THE NEW WINE MOVEMENT

## Specialists of Lo-Fi, Organic and Experimental Styles

Low intervention. Minimal addition. Minimal sulphur. Organic. Small batch. Alternative varieties. These characteristics reflect current wine movements in Australia and many are making quite a splash in Margaret River. One of the most established makers of certified-organic wines is **Stormflower**. Their cellar door showcases the wines as the winemakers like to

enjoy them - seated at a table, in a comfortable chair, in an unhurried style. The aptly-named 'winery door' of certified-organic <u>Rosily Estate</u> offers an 'off the beaten track' experience, while at <u>Churchview Estate</u>, <u>Windance Wines</u> and <u>Settler's Ridge</u> you can uncover many more wonderful wines of organic pedigree.









Windows Estate's organic vineyard tour is a fantastic opportunity to learn the finer details and philosophies behind these increasingly adopted practices within Margaret River. The next level of environmentally sensitive winemaking is the biodynamic movement. Cullen Wines is a widely-known leader, while youthful estate Blind Corner's hands-on family owner-makers also keep bee hives and a veggie patch. Marri Wood Park is another must, as is Burnside Organic Farm, whose farmstay is great fun for families. Single-vineyard estate House of Cards is also completing its organic certification. Here, you'll often find the winemaker behind the tasting bar. Don't miss a Malay-style meal at their restaurant, Chow's, which is a popular eatery of the local chefs.

There's also a rise of unexpected varieties or classic styles made in unexpected ways that is sweeping through the region. Goon Tycoons is a side project of awarded Deep Woods Estate winemaker, Julian Langworthy, which allows for 'colouring outside the lines'. Curio wine lovers will also love Marq Wines, where experimental varieties such as Fiano and Gamay are being made. Dormilona, Amato Vino, LS Merchants, Skigh Wines, Flowstone, Mr Barval and LAS Vino all represent this small-batch scene in Margaret River, known for either their minimal-intervation winemaking or work with alternative varieties. Some of these makers offer tastings by appointment, others can be sourced at local bottle shops, restaurants and bars.









### WINERY PROVIDORES

### Artisan Produce & Paddock-to-Plate Experiences with Epic Wines

Many cellar doors in Margaret River offer artisan wares and other gourmet treats to collect in your travels. A few wineries take this to the next level by making not just wines, but outstanding gourmet produce too. For the sweet tooth, a **Bettenays Wine** and Nougat tasting cannot be missed. Add on a brunch experience to learn directly from their ownermaker about crafting these two delectable treats. Coward and Black Vineyards make an irresistible Chocolate Liqueur that is available to taste at Providore, which also offers an array of local olive oils, dukkahs and condiments to taste and take away. McHenry Hohnen is a biodynamic producer making not just terroir-driven, single-vineyard wines, but very tasty smoked and cured meats, all from freerange, grass-fed livestock. These meats are soughtafter for feasts by the locals (especially winemakers). Stock up for a relaxed dinner if staying by the coast.

The most authentic paddock-to-plate winery lunch experiences can be found at Arimia and Glenarty Road. Arimia exists entirely off the grid and its acclaimed tasting menu features estate-grown pork, trout, eggs, olives, olive oil, grapes, honey, marron, fruit and vegetables with a minimal-waste policy. Glenarty Road, in the south of the Margaret River wine region farms lamb alongside its steely-cool white wines. Their progressive farm walk and tasting tours are an awesome hands-on experience, while the grazing boards and popular 'farm feasts' showcase a fantastic seasonal spread of housemade meats, cheeses, garden pickles, preserves and their famous fresh-baked sourdough bread. In the north, Barnyard 1978's concept cellar door also offers honey tastings of various site-specific drops from their property, along with a family-friendly, contemporary restaurant serving delicious house-made pasta for brunch or lunch.

## **NICHE & MEMORABLE**

## Wine Experiences with an Extra Edge

If seeking an extra unique wine journey, <u>Jester's Flat</u> is an equestrian farm and vineyard which offers a range of horseback tours that take you through the vines and the stunning Margaret River landscape. Several of the tours incorporate winery visits, including lunch options from <u>The Berry Farm</u> (an estate famed for its berry-based wines that is especially family-friendly). Always dreamed of being a winemaker? <u>Clairault-Streicker's</u> wine blending experience can help those ambitions become a reality for a day. The interactive class also includes a three-course lunch. <u>Aravina Estate</u> is a great destination for the whole family, with a popular restaurant, play equipment for the kids, and Margaret River's most significant surf history museum with boards from the 1950s, 60s and 70s on show.









# **MAJOR TOWNS**

#### Dunsborough

Located at the top of the cape and a great base for visiting the many wineries in the region's north with easy access to the pristine, calm waters of Meelup and Castle Rock beaches. Stay in a coastal villa and don't miss dinner at Yarri Restaurant or Bunkers Beach House. Climb Cape Naturaliste Lighthouse for epic views.

#### **Busselton**

A bustling, family-friendly town with a plethora of accommodation options, amenities and activities. Geographe Bay beaches are child-friendly and there are plenty of relaxed waterside dining options nearby the famous Busselton Jetty.


#### **Margaret River**

Central within the region, Margaret River town is a perfect base for any wine travel program. Enjoy bush walking, canoeing or fishing along with wonderful wines, local produce and a thriving fine arts scene.







# **BOYUP BROOK**Classic Country Charm

Boyup Brook is known for its small owner-operated wineries. Make an appointment and be rewarded with an intimate wine tasting with the winemaker or owner. Beulah Wines has spectacular views for a private tasting, and also grows delicious native berries. Boyup Brook is known as the country music capital of WA and has an array of fascinating sculptures and murals around the town to discover. Every year, the town plays host to an iconic country music festival, which attracts thousands of campers to enjoy music under the stars. There's also a great rodeo scene.

# NANNUP Wine, Cheese & Hikes

A characterful timber town with endless walking, cycling and canoeing trails like Munda Biddi and the Bibbulmun Track. Barrabup Pool and Kondil Park have wonderful wildflowers in spring. The annual Nannup Music Festival in March is also a popular time to visit. Stop by Whimwood Estate to taste wine with owners Steve and Maree or absorb the views over a grazing platter. Visit A Taste of Nannup and Beyond, a concept store exhibiting local art and wares or take a bottle of local wine to Cambray Sheep Cheese and enjoy another platter, because why not!

# **BALINGUP**Orchards & Fruit Wine

Surrounded by forests, farmland and orchards, Balingup is known for its local arts, crafts and classic country charm. When it comes to wine, Balingup Fruit Winery, a packing shed cellar door on Balingup's main street, makes ports and liqueurs with fruit from local orchards for a rare treat. An appointment at Hillbillé is great to discover single-vineyard, regional wines. A niche and surely memorable experience is Balingup's annual Medieval Carnivale in August. It kicks off with 'The Feast', an outrageously gluttonous costumed dinner with acrobats, musicians and more.

# SOUTHERN FORESTS

One of Australia's premier cool-climate regions, incorporating Pemberton and Manjimup. The artisanal Pinot Noir and sparkling wines are in hot demand and are often only accessible direct from the wineries, making a visit ultra-rewarding. The pristine environment of dense 300-year-old Karri-tree forest is contrasted against manicured farms, growing more than 50 produce varieties, including world-regarded truffles. A truly mesmerising destination.

Lost Lake Wine's express wine appreciation tour with winemaker Ash is a fun way to start your journey (kids will love their farm animals). Pemberley's Wine Experience also showcases delicious seasonal fare from their veggie

patch. Stop at 10 Chains for a casual tasting or linger over Hidden River Estate's local paddock to plate menu for a long lunch. Serious winos can't miss Picardy, winery of WA legend Bill Pannell (founder of Margaret River icon Moss Wood). By night, head to Jasper's Whisky Bar or Treehouse Tapas & Wine Bar for other local drops. Pemberton buzzes with the harvest and new festival, Pinot Picnic in February.

# **MANJIMUP**

#### Western Australia's Gourmet Food Bowl

A mecca of gourmet food production with a thriving fruit and vegetable industry including avocados, cherries, kiwi fruit, apples and world-famous truffles. Truffle hunts are a once-in-a-lifetime experience and <a href="The Truffle & Wine Co">The Truffle & Wine Co</a> combines the best of both delicacies, complete with authentic dining. <a href="Mountford Wines">Mountford Wines</a> has released Australia's first Truffle

Wine, perfect to taste before perusing their gallery featuring local artists. Don't miss the precious cuvées of **Woodgate Wines** where winemaker Mark is often at the tasting bar. Manjimup hosts two large harvest festivals each year featuring loads of drawcard events. These are Truffle Kerfuffle (June) and Cherry Harmony Festival (December).

## **ALBANY**

#### The Bustling Base for a Great Southern Stay

Albany is the oldest European settlement in Western Australia and is the major centre of the Great Southern, 4.5 hours drive or a 1 hour flight from Perth. It's an ideal base from which to take day trips throughout the entire Great Southern region with a wide variety of accommodation, dining options and experiences in town that will suit all tastes.

The Albany wine sub-region is a small subset of the Great Southern with mostly family-operated vineyards located within a short drive from town. Start your wine experience with a tasting at the charming cellar door of <code>Wignalls Wines</code>, built from a hay shed and vineyard stones. <code>Oranje Tractor</code> is an organic, 'off the grid' winery offering an array of bookable interactive winemaking and dining experiences including farm-grown tasting flights and the unique opportunity to disgorge your own sparkling wine. You can also stay longer term as a farm volunteer.

While in Albany town, get to the famous Boatshed Markets on Sunday to taste local farmer's produce and fresh seafood (you can often find wines from small makers who don't have a cellar door). Dinner at Liberté or the award-winning fish and chips at Ocean and Paddock is essential, while spirits connoisseurs will love Limeburners cellar door for their world-class whisky. After strolling through Albany's colonial architecture and journey to the coast to see The Gap and Natural Bridge; two mind-blowing natural wonders on the rugged south coast.



Grab a pizza during your visit there, or at Arcadia Wines. Gilberts Wines' chocolate and wine flight is as irresistible as their paddock to plate platters, or those of Poacher's Ridge, so ensure eating is high on your agenda when in Mount Barker.

## **DENMARK**

## Majestic Hills Dotted with a Patchwork of Wineries

A relaxed 'village' town, where towering tall trees and luscious forests meet the ocean for incredible coastal scenery. Denmark stands on the spectacular Wilson Inlet and boasts glorious swimming, surfing and fishing beaches. It is a picturesque place to stay and explore the Great Southern with a variety of accommodation options available.

Denmark is made for lazy days and long lunches with many fantastic winery restaurants to select from, including stunning <u>Castelli Estate's</u> Italian restaurant, regional hero <u>Forest Hill's 'Pepper & Salt'</u> for local produce like Wagin Duck and Marron, or the stunning <u>Lake House Wines</u> for a delectable platter. For simpler fare, <u>Willoughby Park Wine</u> is a family-friendly and central option serving pub-style food, day to night.

A vertical tasting at <u>Silverstream</u> is both educational and delicious, while a seated tasting at <u>Singlefile Wines</u> is a must for its esteemed drops and sensational views. The humble cellar door at <u>Harewood Estate</u> is the best way to discover the difference between wine styles throughout the Great Southern's sub-regions without having to travel, particularly by tasting the Rieslings they make to celebrate the varying terroir. Stock up on the house-made cheeses from <u>Ducketts Mill Wines</u> to bring back to your chalet. Alternatively, stock up on some artisan honey. Be mesmerised by nature at Elephant Rocks and the Valley of the Giants which are two unmissable natural attractions. The award-winning pies at Denmark Bakery are the only way to start any day-trip or travel day.



Absorb the tranquil farmland and native forest surrounds by birdwatching, fishing or canoeing. Frankland River is a perfect day trip from Denmark or Pemberton, or pack some gourmet snacks and retreat overnight in a vineyard chalet at Alkoomi Wines.

# Unearth Emerging Wineries & Epic Views



On weekends, book for a vineyard platter, local Dorper Lamb or Smoked Trout from the country kitchen of Rosie at Zarephath Wines. Don't miss the wildflowers in spring.


